KING'S REGULATION

TO PROVIDE FOR THE GIVING OF BONDS BY EMPLOYERS
IN RESPECT OF CERTAIN IMMIGRANTS.

Made by His Britannic Majesty's High Commissioner for the
Western Pacific under the provisions of the Pacific Order in
Council 1893.

In the name of His Majesty, GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace of
God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland
and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender
of the Faith, Emperor of India.

[29th November, 1922.]

1. This Regulation may be cited for all purposes as the Immigrants (Bonds) Regulation 1922. SHORT TITLE.

2. In the event of any person firm or company intending to introduce into the Protectorate under engagement of service any person for the purpose of being employed in the Protectorate as a labourer or servant such person firm or company shall give notice in writing of such intention to the Resident Commissioner at least one month prior to the arrival of the vessel conveying any such labourer or servant as aforesaid. Such notice shall contain all information relating to any such labourer or servant as may be prescribed from time to time by the Resident Commissioner with the approval of the High Commissioner. NOTICE OF INTRODUCTION TO BE GIVEN.

3. Upon receipt of any such notice as aforesaid it shall be lawful for the Resident Commissioner under his hand to require such person firm or company to enter into a bond to His Majesty with two above-mentioned to sureties in such sum as the Resident Commissioner may determine to answer all costs and expenses which may be occasioned by the repatriation or return to the country whence they came of any such labourer or servant should the Resident Commissioner at any time deem it expedient to order the same. POWER TO REQUIRE BOND.

EXECUTION
OF BOND.

4. Any such Bond shall be taken before a Deputy Commissioner or the Collector of Customs and shall be in the form in the Schedule to this Regulation.

PENALTY ON
FAILURE TO
GIVE NOTICE
OR BOND.

5. Any person firm or company who refuses or neglects to give the notice required by section two of this Regulation or when required by the Resident Commissioner so to do to enter into the Bond in the last preceding section mentioned shall be liable on conviction by the Court to a fine not exceeding five hundred pounds.
