

Hearing of 16<sup>th</sup> August, 1917.

Métairie and Larrea, agt Public Revenue

The year 1917, 16<sup>th</sup> August, at 9 am, the Court met composed of Messrs the President, and de Bensa Supervisors, the French Judge, Jean Lohouais, the British Judge, Gilchrist, and the Registrar, in the presence of the acting Public Prosecutor, Blagel, who was acting Registrar, recording;

Sitting in public hearing, in full and last resort, delivered the following judgment:

The Court

Considering that Larrea and Métairie, natives of Ouedes had been condemned by judgment of the 13<sup>th</sup> August to a fine of £200 and failed to appear through duly summoned, at the hearing of the 13<sup>th</sup> August;

Considering that on the day, 16<sup>th</sup> August, 1917, Métairie and Larrea ignored the judgment and that the period for so doing has expired;

Considering that the above named have submitted valid appeals to the Court based on the fact that Métairie and Larrea summoned to hearings of different cases and unable to read had confused the dates of these hearings;

Considering that it is found that on account of the dates confusion, their non-appearance at the hearing of the 13<sup>th</sup> August is explained;

In these respects

Attends the appeals submitted by Larrea and Métairie, and the Court pronounced against them at the hearing of the 16<sup>th</sup> August last.

So done, judged and pronounced, the day, month and year as above and signed by the President, the French Judge, the British Judge and the Registrar of the Court.
