

Constitutional sitting, 1<sup>st</sup> October, 1912,

No. 914. Public Prosecutor against Jean Louis Chazot, blacksmith, Vila,  
accused of breach of Article 59 of the Convention of 1906.

The year 1912, 1<sup>st</sup> October, at 9 am, the joint court composed of: Messrs the President,  
Comte Louis Esperanza, the French judge, Jean Colonna, the British judge, Gilbert  
Alexander; In the presence of the Public Prosecutor, Comte d'Audius; M. Beugel,  
Registrar, recording;  
Sitting in police jurisdiction, public hearing, first and last resort, delivered the  
following judgment:

The Joint Court:

Having heard the documents in the case read; the offender in his denials;  
Considering that from the depositions of the witnesses heard, under oath, and the  
contradictions raised in the course of their statements, no certain proof is adduced  
that Chazot did "two weeks before the 15<sup>th</sup> September, 1912," as per the report  
drawn up by the Officer reporting on the latter date, sell two bottles of wine  
to the witness Trood;

For these reasons:

Dismiss Chazot from the prosecution without costs; charges the costs in the  
case to the Condominium Treasury.

Done, judged and delivered the day, month and year  
as above; signed by the President, the French and British  
judges and the Registrar.
